You are required to write an essay of 500 words which highlights global issues with water. Research the topic using the following information:

You will need information on the authors of the above to be able to contextualise them in your essay. You may also research other resources, provided you cite them in the essay and include them in the references.

The aim of your essay is to highlight two areas:

- the human right to have access to clean water
- water grabbing and its consequences.

The introduction should have a statement of purpose and the conclusion should focus on possible solutions and future consequences.

Formatting your essay

A contents page and abstract are not required but you must include:

- Title page (see p. 2 for an example)
- Main body
- References
